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



MAX'S "BEE" MOVIE














ON FILM EDITING by Edward Dmytryk, Focal Press

The small paperback book by Edward Dmytryk, *On Film Editing*, is the fourth book in the series; the others being, *On Screen Writing*, *On Screen Directing* and *On Screen Acting*. The editing volume struck me as being well worth the study and may be of interest to others as well. Along with the usual recommendations found in such books, of how to make the cut from one scene to another, I found many interesting snippets. I will briefly mention one of them, *the 3 to 5 frame overlap technique*, but I recommend the reading of the book for a full understanding.

The action cut (with the *action* being anything from major movement of the subject to slight movement such as the turn of the head), only requires the movement to be such that it will catch the viewer's attention. This is not new, but I was interested to read that the second shot should have a 3 to 5 frame OVERLAP with the first shot. The example given was where an actor exits the first shot on the left hand side of the frame and re-enters in the second shot on the right hand side. Now the cut for the first shot is made when the actor's *eyes* exit the frame and the second shot starts 3 to 5 frames *before* the eyes re-enter in the second shot.

These 3 to 5 frames are also required when you cut from a person looking out of the frame to the next shot showing what the person is looking at. The first cut is made when the actor's eyes haven frozen PLUS a further 3 to 5 frames to ensure the viewer has reacted. Then again these 3 to 5 frames appeared in the editing of dialogue scenes where, when cutting from speaker to the listener with a reaction expected from the listener, then 3 to 5 frames of empty action should occur *before* the listener reacts.

The reason for the 3 to 5 frames it is suggested is that it provides that brief moment needed by the audience to focus their eyes on the new scene. In the first example I quoted, it allows the eyes to move from the left hand side of the screen back to the centre. The 3 to 5 frames also relate to the time taken for a person to blink, ie., about 1/5 th of a second. Hence the old trick of covering a cut by using a loud sound which causes the eyes to blink.

Minimalist cinema

Minimalist cinema with its seemingly plotless narratives, restricted use of camera positions, and frequent use of unprofessional actors—may have its own, extremely refined and often rigorous aesthetic, but this aesthetic is also a product of significant political resistance to hegemonic political and cultural ideas, discourse and media. For this reason, relevant issues in post-colonial theory will frame the general approach to the course material. Minimalist films attempt to capture the realities of life including the awkward pauses in conversation, the moments in which "nothing" is happening and the mundane details of simple everyday tasks. This sense of "real life" is accomplished by reducing the intrusion of obvious filmmaking techniques. Editing is kept at a minimum to prevent drawing attention to the camera and music is not used as a manipulating force as it is in regular Hollywood films. There is nothing outlandish in this sort of film. There are no elaborate action sequences or special-effects laden images. Minimalist film is more interested in the kind of situations one might record on a camcorder at home.
