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
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FROM THE EDITOR'S POINT OF VIEW

Ask not what your Club can do for you, ask what you can do for your Club.


It is a common experience in associations and clubs where people gather to share a common interest such as photography, that it is the few that carry the majority. Also the larger the majority, the more that is required from the few. The excuse often given by the majority for not helping is that they already have too busy a life. Implying that the few that are doing all the work have somehow a much less busy a life. Also in club with a large attendance on meeting nights, you can easily slip in and out without anyone noticing and so avoid being lumbered with having to do something to help the club function.

In a world which values "rights" without "responsibilities"; "experiences" without "commitment"; "instant results" without "hard work"; is it not surprising that *service* is no longer seen as a valid activity. Service to a club means more than turning up on a meeting night at the stroke of the "starting bell" expecting all the equipment to be set up, the chairs in place and the chairperson ready to start the meeting just after you sit down. Service means more than entering in the club competition and then waiting for the result to magically appear. Service means more than attending club activities and workshops where all has been prepared for you just to do your thing.

Service means giving back to an organisation more than you took from it. Service means helping your fellow members whenever they needed it. Service means taking your turn on management committees so that you could help guide your club. Service means volunteering to help with club activities. Service means helping to run meetings and workshops.

Our Movie Makers Group has never been a large gathering. At its height in 2002 we were averaging 20 members at meetings, now we are averaging 9 members. When club meetings are attended by such a small number it is hard to be invisible, it is hard to sit back and let others do the work, it is hard not to contribute. With such a small number of attendees you are obliged to pull your weight; your comments are important; your contributions are valued, your help is not only warmly accepted but necessarily needed.

As our clubs generally, and FAMM itself, dwindle in size, it is very clear than if we want such organisations to continue then *service* must once again become one of our key motivators. We cannot leave it to the other person because that "other person" is quickly disappearing. We need to have a very frank talk to ourselves and assess our skills, our personality and our capability and then decide what we can do for our Club.

PICTURE LOCK





Corsair's Very Fast SSDs

Corsair's new Neutron Series XTi solid state drives offer all that the videomaker could ever wish for. They are designed for consistent fast performance so as to handle all the high data rates from 4K video. To achieve high read and write speeds, the XTi uses a dedicated quad-core controller. But it is not only fast it is energy efficient too. Corsair claims a power consumption that is 95% less



than a standard hard disc drive. Unfortunately this speed and capacity does not come cheap. It is estimated that the 1.92 TB drive will cost about \$1200.

Panavision's 8K Camera

In the professional cinema field, one of the most exciting and spectacular developments of 2016 is the release by *Panavision* of its 8K capable video camera. *Panavision*, famous in the cine days for their professional cameras, has joined forces with the companies, *Light Iron* and *RED*, to produce the Panavision Millennium DXL camera which they claim is "the most advanced digital camera ever made. It's a super computer with modular accessories and superior



RED electronics." *Light Iron*'s input was for a colourist to design the colour science of the camera. Though capable of 8K recording, at present these files would be sent to the archives, whilst 4K and 2K files are used for broadcast requirements. If this sounds a bit too futuristic for us amateurs, be aware that Panasonic is already planning 8K cameras for the domestic market.

NVIDIA introduces the GTX 1060 Video Card

Once upon a time, not so long ago, computers were simple tools; the processor did all the work and the video card just had to image simple screens of words, numbers and generally still images. Back then you worried about the processor's speed and whether your hard disc could keep up. Now with complex games and video editing, the



processor needs a bit of help to get the tasks down. Now the video card comes to the rescue with additional processing power and additional memory. To make a faster video card Nvidia had to reduce the size of the transistors from 28nm to 16nm. Once this was achieved they were then able to pack more transistors onto the same card size and importantly the video card uses less power and hence does not run as hot as the older models.

Da Vinci Resolve 12.5

Those with modern fast processors and video cards, the new, free to download, Da Vinci Resolve 12.5 Lite editing software is worth a try. It now recognises more file types than before so you may like it.
