January 2020

COVID-19 Health Effects & Responses

January 13 – Thailand reports its first case out of China.

Mid-January – Second case detected in Japan, two cases in Thailand, one case in Japan and 40 in Wuhan.

Within 2 weeks from the first case reported in China there were reports in 20 other countries.

<u>January 19 – China airline flight brought the virus into Melbourne. Five days later Monash Medical</u> Centre gets its first case. The same day three cases are reported in Sydney.

January 30 – WHO declares a Global Emergency.

January 31 – USA bans arrivals from China.

February 11 - Guest Speaker for the evening is our Club's long-time friend, Roy Killen. Roy is a wonderful photographer and his main interest is "nature/wildlife" photography. Roy will be doing a presentation on "Nature Photography" and you will have the opportunity to see and hear about the techniques he uses, the photographic equipment he carries and hopefully get some valuable insight into what is required when photographing nature or wildlife.

February 25 – This was to be the last normal competition night where members gather with their prints in hand.

Even in February it was possible to have a public exhibition in a shopping mall

Sunday 16th February is the "Kanahooka Bird Walk" starting at 8.00 am at the Lakeside Reserve.

Sunday 23rd February is "Motocross" at the Wollongong Motorcycle Club, Mount Kembla.

23 February 2020 saw another Club activity as advised by the secretary:

March 11 – WHO classifies COVID-19 as a pandemic. The Australian Grand Prix 2020 is cancelled.

March 13 – National Crisis Cabinet formed of Federal and State leaders and chief medical officers.

March 16 – No nonessential gatherings of 500 or more people.

March 19 – Italy has 3,450 deaths from the virus.

Both Club meetings at the beginning of March went ahead as normal. Concerns about the spreading virus raised questions on how to best run forthcoming meetings and the AGM. Between the last normal Club meeting on the 10th of March and the scheduled AGM on the 17th many attempts were made to adjust to the rapidly changing health requirements. At times it was difficult to keep up with National and State requirements never mind Club changes.

March 22

However, the rapidly moving National and State health requirements put an end to the normal AGM meeting format so that on March 22 the following was notified to members:

The current situation with Coronavirus/COVID-19 in Australia is seeing daily, even hourly, changes to how, when and where we can conduct our normal way of life and business. The Australian National Cabinet on Health Dept (Chief Medical Officers') advice has resulted in how the Wollongong Camera Club manages its affairs from general to Management meetings.

March 22

AGM

The Club's 2020 Annual
General Meeting is being
conducted via email. I have
canvassed my 2019
Management Committee
with the majority supporting
this move to an email
process. Both Sue Souter and
Dawne are currently out of
the country and were unable
to respond to my request.

March 14

This Meeting will continue to be at the School unless you are notified by the Club as per my previous email and Post to you. Currently, there is NO CHANGE to time, date and venue.

March 16

In light of the continual spread of the Coronavirus/COVID-19 and reports of new infection cases in the Illawarra this afternoon an abridged AGM will be held as scheduled at Figtree Heights Primary School at 7:30pm on Tuesday, March 17th 2020. Should there be a change due to the School's shut down you will be advised by email.

March 17

We are in difficult times with the wide spread of Coronavirus/COVID-19 virus as it is affecting all facets of our lives.

This evening's Wollongong Camera Club AGM (Tuesday, March 17th 2020) has been POSTPONED to a date and place as yet to be determined.

We apologise for the inconvenience that this late decision, and notification, may have on you for this evening. I'm sure you'll understand our decision as the situation has changed in the last few hours.

March 20 – Federal Government requirements are; wash hands for 20 seconds frequently or use hand sanitisers, don't touch your face, keep at least 1.5 metres away from everyone. If you get the virus you must self-isolate for 14 days or if you are unwell go to hospital. No more handshakes just elbow bumps.

March 20 – With infections in Australia quadrupling every week, a ban is introduced on all foreigners entering the country. Federal Government raises the travel advice to Level 4 – Do Not Travel.

On the very day the AGM was called off, Brian Harvey the incoming President was asking:

Has anyone had live streaming experience? If so let me know as we may have to go this way in the near future.

Thus began the holding of virtual Club meetings using the conference meeting software *Zoom*, as the newly elected President advised,

As we are preparing to enter this new era of the Club, the future meetings will be held online using a software package called "Zoom".

March 25

Three Movie Makers members trialled the Zoom software. The findings were to watch each other's videos we will needed to do this in a controlled, programmed manner where we stop the conferencing and separately action the video's URL and after watching the video return to the video meeting. The implication of this is that members wishing to show videos will need to upload their videos to a site prior to the meetings and then advise by email of the URLs.

March 28

A further session prepared the way for the first Zoom meeting of Club members on Tuesday 7th of April.

April 7

Seven members joined the Zoom meeting to show their short videos on the topic "Water with Music".

Another major change was how to run the Photography Group's print competitions. They had to become digital images and judged on line as detailed in an email on the 30th of March:

All Competitions are to be online judged utilising the MPC system with the currently booked judges. This does pose some issues and I am sure you will be pleased to hear that the requirement to actually produce a mounted image for each Print category is not necessary until further notice

However, the requirements for the Print of the Year 2020 are, that you are still required to enter a mounted image for each Print Category for judging at the end of the year. The actual points scoring regime will remain the same for the whole year.

April 14

The Photography Group's first Zoom meeting was an extravaganza of members' presentations.

The Club's presentation meeting will be a very interesting time. We are all going to be using the Zoom software to view and listen to four very interesting speakers. It has been a learning curve for the club members to see how it will be to have a face to face meeting with all the speakers and discuss their presentations. So I, as your President, have had a rehearsal with the speakers and I am sure it will be very interesting for all.

The meeting will commence promptly at 7:30 pm and how long it lasts will be up to you and the speakers.

As the meeting will be shown online using the Share method, I would ask you all to have patience and choose the right time to ask your questions.

March 20 - Ruby Princess cruise ship docks in Sydney with no controls and with crew and passengers infected.

March 23 – From mid-day all clubs, restaurants, hotels, cafes, entertainment venues, cinemas, casinos and night clubs are closed. Victorian schools are closed for an early start to holidays and to prepare for online learning. Football matches and horseracing occurred to empty stadiums and race courses.

March 25 – Ban on overseas travel from 12 noon, only 5 people can attend a wedding and 10 to attend a funeral, beauty salons to close from mid-night. Everyone told to stay at home unless you need to go out for food, medical appointment, education or work. All parties are banned and no inviting the neighbours or extended family over for a BBQ, etc.

March 26 – Police will give on the spot \$1K fines for not observing social distancing (1.5 m rule).

March 29 – First signs of getting some control on the spread of the virus – the rate of rise of infections has dropped from a high of 25 to 30% last week to 13 to 15% over the weekend.

March 29 – All arrivals by plane are sent to hotel rooms to isolate for 14 days with police and army reserves manning the hotel entrances.

March 29 – people can only gather in a group of 2 unless they are a family unit.

April 3 – 10% of NSW infections have come from passengers and crew of the Ruby Princess cruise ship.

April 14 – Australia's jobless rate could reach 10%. Federal Government introduces a Jobkeeper programme to help employers keep employees on the books by paying the employer \$750 per week per employee.

April 16 – It took 83 days for infections world-wide to reach 1 million cases and only 14 days to get to 2 million. The USA now has one third of the world-wide infections.

April 19 – Infection rate now less than 1%.

John introduces us to the FREE editing software and the process of how it works.

This is NOT how to edit a video but how you can understand this product and see if its what you could use for editing your audio visuals or videos.

LAST MONTH at the CLUB

7th April 2020

The Movie Makers first Zoom meeting saw 7 members in attendance at their home computers. After settling everyone down to this new environment and technology, it was time for members to show their videos made to the theme "Water with Music".

First up were videos from Ann Devenish and John Devenish with footage taken in a Japanese Garden in Auburn. Although both video share common scenes they exhibit different approaches to this subject.

In *Auburn Waters*, https://vimeo.com/404273272, Ann gives a view not only of the water features but of the garden itself. The images are married to gentle piano music which gives a restful feeling to the whole video.

In John Devenish's *AUBURN 2020*, https://vimeo.com/402756594. we see mainly the water features with the fish that inhabit the pools and the birds that visit. Again gentile music is ideally matched to the gentle flow of water and the movement of fish and birds.

From Ann Devenish was *Water*, https://vimeo.com/404151499. Ever since childhood we were taught how to wash our hands. Now with the spread of COVID-19, we have our National leaders telling us how to wash our hands. In this short video, John demonstrates the 20 second soapy wash method and also supplies most of the music for the video himself by humming the tune.

Ian Simpson presented "Of Droughts and Flooding Rains", https://vimeo.com/404226181. Here we see the gradual build up in water flow from a trickle over rocks, to streams, to flood waters, to a storm, and finally a water wipe out. As the volume of water increases so does the volume of the music and its pace.

Bruce Shaw in his audio-visual takes us to Mossman Gorge in *Under Construction*, https://vimeo.com/404925083. Again gentile paced music is matched a similarly paced selection of water and rocks photographs.

Tom Hunt in his video takes us on a day out *Sailing St Georges Basin*, https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xkcl4w6Fifg&app=desktop. Once again slow paced music was selected to enhance the leisurely family day out sailing. Good use was made of a GoPro to get those shots of members in the boat.

Christopher Dunn in his video introduced us to the world of *Water Sliders*, https://vimeo.com/404511506. Chris chose upbeat music to match the movement of the water and that of the water sliders. This video was the only one to contain some narration, where Chris explained some aspects of the life of these insects.

Another interesting mixture of approaches to the one topic, with the majority choosing gentle paced music to match similar paced water movement and water flows.

21st April 2020



First up was Tom Hunt's demonstration of how to simply create an animated path of a journey on a map by using the wipe special effect in your editing software. Tom used the software iMovie but the idea and application could easily be transferred to other non-Apple software.




Tom Hunt's presentation on Captain Cook's journey

When to shoot in B&W

In an article in <u>Technique</u> Daniel Brockett tackles the question of why would you shoot a video in Black and White? The current attitude to B&W movies he said are that they are "Artsy. Pretentious. Old fashioned. Boring. Period look. Outdated. Rich. Simple. Silent movie. Horror. Film noir." Strangely such generally negative comments are not thrown at our Photography Group members when they submit their B&W prints – there is even a separate competition for them and at our annual dinner the B&W prints are comfortably exhibited alongside their more colourful print cousins. So why is such scorn placed on a B&W movie?

Daniel gives some good pointers as to when to make a movie B&W:

- "Black and white effectively sets the mood for the cynicism and violence of such genres as film noir."
- "Ask yourself these questions: Who is your audience? What's the subject matter? Also, look carefully at your script and story—does black and white improve the story, style or genre of the film? Does it help tell a better story?"

New Low Price for Pocket Cinema Camera 6K

Blackmagic Design's popular Pocket Cinema Camera 6K will now set you back \$3955 – a reduction of nearly \$1000. So what do get for nearly \$4K? A large 6144 by 3456 Super 35 sensor and EF lens mount. The latter is great if you are a Canon lens fan.

Blackmagic Design claim this camera has a 13 stop dynamic range which is about double what we were used to with our smaller chip camcorders. Footage can



be captured in either ProRes or Blackmagic RAW and an hour of footage in 6K resolution can fit on a 256GB SD UHSII card. Whilst the menu system is easy to operate the camera seems more at home in professional rigs attached to a tripod than in the hand, outdoors on bright sunny day.

Are we ready for H.265?

We all know that to effectively save our video footage, in real time, to our solid-state cards requires a lot of computing – meaning



compression of the data – meaning throwing away a lot of data got from the sensor. The secret in codecs is to do this and for us to not notice what has been lost. It is said H.265 compared to AVC codec gives 25% to 50% better data compression at the same level of video quality or improved quality at the same bit rate. H.265 supports resolutions up to 8K and 10 bit colour. Unfortunately with each advance in shooting higher and higher resolutions, there also comes a cost when you want to edit that footage – you have to uncompress it. Here lies the problem, computers that work well with HD footage start to slow down with 4K footage and may grind to a halt with H.265.
