

Business:


Brian mentioned the following items:

Bruce mentioned that the Movie Makers voted on Tuesday February 2nd and reminded four members attending this Feb 9th meeting they could not vote. The Comp Rules Revision 8.0 was ratified by a majority of members attending both meeting.

Our Presenter: June Andersen

When June Andersen discovered that she could use photography's unique characteristic, the suspension of time in a picture frame, she has developed a passion for nature and photography. She has captured her experiences, whether it's a bird, fungi, landscape to relive that experience and to share it with others.





June says "... seeing someone disappointed and frustrated because they don't know how to operate their camera is such a shame. I get great joy from my photography. I thought it would be wonderful to see others achieve the same satisfaction and pleasure that I do." She a teacher

June is an educator with a wealth of experience both in Australia and overseas, with the ability to make the most complex - and the most basic - procedures easily understood, is a regular contributor to the art and framing magazine, "Profile", (www.profilemagazine.com.au) as well as a guest speaker at the Photo Marketing Association Imaging Technology Show (www.pmaaustralia.com.au)

"Mastering the creative and logistical challenges is the key to capturing the images you want."

Presentation: "Nature Photography".

In her introduction June said that nature is a wonderful world of discovery. She brief outline of her presentation, covering Birds, Close Up and Macro and Nightscapes. She commented that that nature photography never disappoints however the photographers' greatest disappointment is not capturing what you have seen. Photographers need to remember that cameras are governed by the Laws of Physics, Laws of Mechanics and the Laws of Optics and we have to work within these boundaries. Nature Photography is a real mixed bag; a mix of subjects, a mix of equipment and a mix of techniques.

<u>Birds</u>. Australia is the land of birds and we are fortunate to have such a wide diversity of birdlife. We

are not short of subjects with birds often coming to us, in our backyards, in National Parks, our waterways. Yet birds can be frustrating to photograph; hiding in trees, way out of our lens' capability, they are fast, darting, finding ways to frustrate the photographer. We need to make the most of what we have; subject, equipment-wise.

Birds are moving subjects. June briefly spoke about how she kits up for a bird session using a monopod with a body bracing system to secure the longer lens and carry its weight, ease of maneuverability



with a gimbal for the camera to attach to. June mentioned that she uses a 300mm f2.8 lens with a 1.4x

Convertor giving a focal length of 420mms. June noted that a problem with a longer lens is its weight and the angle of view is very reduced and trying to find the bird in the viewfinder. This applies equally to birds in flight and to those running along the beach.

The use of a fast shutter speed is essential especially for birds in flight. June commented that she uses between 1/1600th and 1/5000th second shutter speed for a sharp image. At times she will push the shutter even faster.

The camera's Focus Tracking systems are important and it's up to the photographer to work out how and what system to use. There is no one focus tracking system that suites all situations. So the photographer need to be familiar with their camera, the controls

and where they are located on the camera so as to move quickly from one option to another, thus she uses the back button focusing for its ability to change quickly. June engages the spot (centred) single focus point for stationary birds but will switch to multi-point for birds in flight. June warned us about

tree foliage/branches or ground covers in the foreground that the camera doesn't lock upon these. So look before operating the shutter.

June briefly commented upon Depth of Field (DoF), how it can affect your

images and the equipment elements of lens focal length, aperture selected and the distance from the camera to the subject. She said that she is in Manual Mode, selecting the shutter speed and aperture setting and letting the ISO to float, thereby the ISO is doing all the work. June demonstrated this with several images with varying shutter speed and/or different aperture effects. She also demonstrated how the distance to

subject affects the DoF. By standing further back, a greater separation distance is achieved allowing more details to be seen in the image hence any DoF a photographer can gain is a big plus.

Close-up and Macro

June commented that this is a wonderful world to explore and you never know what you'll find each time you enter it. You often find extra, unexpected things in the image that you hadn't seen when capturing the image. Yet it is one of the hardest disciplines to master.

Due to close proximity to the subject the DoF is very shallow. Subject movement is vast, from stationary (fungi) to very fast (insects in flight). This will dictate the photographer's camera settings,

usually with an aperture around $f11 \sim f22$ and a fast shutter speed to stop the action, however this reduces the amount of light to the sensor. A non-moving subject, a tripod can be used to compensate for the longer shutter speeds. But for moving subjects, a fast shutter speed is required. One can push the ISO higher however this also increases the noise in the image. Thus extra lighting is required. June uses a Nikon SB400 Flash unit, off camera at the front, above the lens with a diffuser angled down to provide a soft lighting effect with some modelling. This also works well with flowers, allowing June to photograph flowers throughout the day, being able to control the

light. She mentioned that she'll occasionally use a polarizer filter to reduce the glare and shine from the foliage, but it will reduce the light by up to a stop.

Focus Stacking. June spoke about the advantages of focus stacking in Close-up and Macro photography. She demonstrated this with a 29 image focus stack of fungi along a branch. By changing the focus point very slightly on the lens, June was able to capture images from near to far in focus. IN the post production editing June uses either Helicon Focus[®] or Zerene Stacker[®].

June demonstrated the many facets of her presentation with a series of frog images, how the DoF drops off dramatically and how to maximize the DoF she has Firstly she backs off slightly to increase the DoF and s

the DoF she has. Firstly she backs off slightly to increase the DoF and secondly to photograph the subject in one plane only (slide on, front on, etc). Macro photography is so precise and 1 mm is the

difference between capturing the image and a total miss. She chooses to use the DX crop (further back, thus increasing the DoF) capture of her full frame camera along with an aperture of f11.

Nightscapes

June said this is her favourite thing to do, however the mindset approach to nightscape is total different to nature and close-up and macro photography. The photographer has to consider various parameters as we are not looking at a moving object, rather a revolving earth, so we need to work within the rotation of the earth.

Shutter speeds are important so as not to capture star trails but rather have points of light. The recommended night sky shutter speeds is around $1/20^{th}$ second, with longer shutter speeds increases the possibly of picking up star trails. June's camera settings are usually $1/13^{th}$ second with an aperture of f2.8, ISO set around $4000 \sim 5000$ with White Balance set to 4000 degrees Kelvin working in manual mode with a 24mm lens. June will capture a series of photographs. She will capture the Milky Way as a vertical panorama stitching the individual images together latter. June will pre-focus, during daylight, of her furthest focus point for a clear, sharp focal point, saying its easier to focus in daylight than the night light. She reminded us that the infinity (∞) mark on our lens isn't the true infinity due to a variety of reasons, however the lens design is a major contributor with the glass elements expanding and contracting so there is design variable incorporated with this. Thus the lens' ∞ marking is an approximation, hence the need to pre-focus the lens. June recommends that photographers do their lens profiles in their photo editing packages so as to get the best results.

June summarised the technical aspects:

Chairperson, Brian Harvey, concluded the evening thanking June for a very interesting evening that challenged the members to work harder in capturing their subject in this very small world of nature, close-up and macros and nightscapes. June replied that photography is all about enjoying yourself and making the most of the time whilst out on the shoot. Thank you June for your time and sharing your images with us.

Tuesday, February 23rd 2021

Brian mentioned the following:



Our Judge: Dianne Goodman

Brian introduced our judge for the evening, Dianne Goodman who is a Visual Arts & Photomedia artist and educator. She is interested in hands-on learning and marvel at the insight artists' gain about themselves when working and playing throughout the creative process. Like the journey of life itself, every artwork, every image, every project, reveals the self as a work-in-progress!





imagery to digital practice. Manipulation of the image has always excited her, no matter what medium. The push and pull of watercolour, photographic and drawing technology invites creative expression and enables the visual language of the artist/photographer.

Competition: "Open"

Dianne thanked the Club for the invitation to critique the members' images and commented that it was hard to decide the final images in all sections.

Digital Images:

Dianne said that she has written extensive comments for the Digital entries (found on the website) and mentioned that she was looking for the



way the photographers had used the lighting and composition to create a narrative with their images. She was looking how the photographers' created a mood and build upon it for the final image.

Dianne consistently asked "... what is being presented to the viewer?" To her this is the fundamental question all photographers need to ask themselves before operating the shutter and enhancing the story through post editing. To her it's about creating a journey for the viewer with the photographer, through their skills, guiding the viewer to where and how that journey should be.

Dianne highlighted several areas where the photographers could improve. Time of Day, the time the image was taken and how that relates to the light's temperature and colour. Early morning/late afternoon warmer, softer lighting with harsh blue cooler lighting throughout the middle of the day will have a bearing on the image. Lighting creates mood. Dianne also mention "... what the background ..." by looking throughout the image before shooting and taking evasive actions (moving to side, another angle or viewpoint, using a shallow Depth of Field/Aperture), to eliminate as much distractions in the background as possible. Another catch cry for the evening was "... where's the Centre of Interest?" Dianne said that the viewer needs to look around the image but at the end their eyes need a place to rest. Does this happen in your image?

The judge's comments for Ray's Digital Best In Section were: "What a wonderful narrative and what great choices you have made to support and depict your vision. Technical and creative aspects of this image combine to portray a strong sense of memory, time and place. Beautifully composed to create a sense of depth, not only in terms of space, but in terms of the narrative that unfolds as the viewer's eye traverses all areas of the picture frame. The texture, colours and details captured within this image provoke the imagination and engage the senses, as a means of either stepping back in time, or re-imagining a past time. Perfectly exposed, focused and rendered! Excellent work!"

Prints:

Colour Prints

In the Colour Print categories, Dianne again mentioned several areas cover in the Digital category; Centre of Interest (CoI), Composition, Depth of Field (DoF) and Time of Day. She asked "... where is your CoI?" My eyes travel around but there is no key element to rest at. She said this is important, especially to the story line for the viewer to know why you are placing your image before them.

Bold colours, along with striking shapes, grab the viewer's attention so look for these key elements within your image to draw the viewer, but beware of their placement as they can be just as much as a distraction as they are an attraction. Use the scene's colours as the viewer's invitation to come and look at me. Just as bold colours "hit you in the face", subtle colours with bring a sense of harmony and peace.

When it comes to composition, the final image format is just as important. Dianne mentioned that the format (landscape, portrait, square, panoramic, etc) can be used to draw the viewer to the key elements/shapes of the image. Try different formats before deciding upon the final image.

Monochrome Prints

Dianne's initially comment on the Monochrome Prints "A" Grade was that they were highly competitive resulting in a difficult choice of her final Awards.

Dianne's general comments on both "A" and "B" Grade entries took similar lines to her previous Digital and Colour Prints of CoI, DoF and composition. She suggested that photographers consider the use of tools within in their Photo Editing Packages especially for contrast and dodging/burning local areas for enhancing the image.

Dianne asked several new questions, like "... where's my (the viewer's) focus to be?" and "... can I enhance the image?" These may sound simple however in realty they are overlooked. Both situations have a bearing upon the image's drawing power upon the viewer. So it's worth the time to learn to use such tools. Dianne's thoughts upon composition was that keeping it simple always working. Too many elements confuse the viewer, harder to read the image and understand the storyline. Remember, if it isn't needed, leave it out. How? Start with your camera skills; look for a different angle of view (if possible), or a different angle to eliminate/reduce the distraction's effect. Complete the task with your Post Production editing (cropping, adding a blur or some other effect).

One sure way to creating viewer attention is to capture human interest subjects. It's important that there is a relationship between the subject and the photographer, either in a direct way (looking at the camera) or indirectly (sport's event). People love people. Textures and contrast play a big role in this, so look around the image's environment for the best/complimentary lighting conditions. Subtle shadows can produce great textural details.

Brian thanked Kath, his wife, allowing him to be a part of the Club. He also thanked the 2020/21 Committee members for their support during a very testing COVID-19 pandemic.

Brian asked all members to assist with the pack up, clearing adhering to the Club's new COVID Safe Place procedure with cleaning, packing, storing equipment and most importantly social distancing.
